



Director's Notes

Supporting the voices of new playwrights is an essential part of mentoring the next generation of writers for the American Stage. During the COVID-19 pandemic, LCC Drama had the opportunity to sponsor film productions of five new plays. The Story About the Tattoo and Native Gardens by Latina playwright Karen Zacarías exposed our students and our audiences to the voice of one of the country's most exciting contemporary playwrights. Closer to home, two LCC students saw film versions of their original plays brought to life. Cassandra Halleck's Club Greg and Runners Telephone along with Andrew Gomes' Blue Collar Anonymous can still be viewed on YouTube (https://youtu.be/Q2JIVAk6EWk). Following the interests of our students, LCC Drama brought guest artist and award-winning playwright Sue Mach to LCC during the pandemic to offer a playwrighting workshop. Kaitlin Sexton, the author of this spring's production, Lost in the Foreground, attended that workshop and appeared in Halleck's Runners Telephone. Perhaps inspired by those experiences, Kaitlin dared to write a play and then to share it with our Act One Drama Club last fall. After reading an unfinished version of the play in October, students were wildly enthusiastic to hear Kaitlin's ending and to produce the play this spring. Kaitlin has rewritten and workshopped the play with us and this final production bears witness to the confidence we have in Kaitlin's unique voice and gifts. We are so appreciative of her trusting us to midwife her first full length play and we have loved every minute of it. We hope you enjoy this step of the play's journey. Every play must start somewhere, and we are so happy that this one started here!

She has worked at Oregon Children's Theatre, Portland Actors Conservatory, Artists Repertory Theatre, Lakewood Theatre, Portland Accessible Theater, and the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. Elizabeth's passion for Theatre for Social Justice has led to work with Coffee Creek Correctional Facility, Planned Parenthood, and others. Theatre Arts Classes and Opportunities ~ Fall Quarter 2023 Drama Classes

Behind the Scenes and Onstage

Introduction to Theatre DRMA 101 is a college transfer course that studies the history, development, and the many areas of theater required to produce a play. In addition to directing, acting, and playwriting, students will learn about set, light, and costume design through the study of the current Center Stage play and other plays from various periods of history. Taught by Betsy Richard.

Acting DRMA 106 & 206 are college transfer classes that study the methods, techniques, and theories of acting as an art form. Taught by Betsy Richard in Center Stage Theater. This course is offered every quarter as DRMA 106/206, 107/207, 108/208 and each quarter focuses on a unique aspect of Acting. Fall Quarter's focus is Scene Study and Acting Theory. The courses do not have to be taken in sequence.

Stagecraft DRMA 116/117/118 are college transfer courses that teach the basic principles of stage design, lighting, and construction of sets for our productions! Enjoy fun, hands-on education taught by our expert technical theater instructor Robert Cochran. This course does not need to be taken in sequence and is offered every quarter.

Theater Rehearsal and Performance DRMA 196/296 is a college transfer course that invites you to work on a Center Stage production! Each term LCC does a fully produced, *fully face-to-face*, full-length play. Auditions are the first week of each term, and you can earn credits by working on stage or offstage in the beautiful Center Stage Theatre. Instructor permission required. Betsy Richard directs.

Act One Drama Club produces each quarter's play selection, participates in Campus Culture, and takes field trips to Seattle and Portland to see plays and tour theaters!
