Rebuilding for the Future

Lower Columbia College Foundation is evaluating the feasibility of a capital campaign to fund new equipment that will elevate the College's vocational programs into a world-class skills center and athletic facilities and scholarships. The \$7M campaign will advance student opportunity, develop our region's future workforce, and create facilities that benefit our entire community.

The College

Established in 1934, Lower Columbia College was founded during the Great Depression by community leaders seeking a better future for high school graduates. Today, the College is a comprehensive community and technical college offering 70+ programs and serving over 4,000 students each year. Recognized for its excellence in nursing, workforce training, academic preparation, and athletics, the College serves as the educational center for the entire Lower Columbia region.

Rebuilding Community

As we recover after COVID-19, Lower Columbia College is positioned to deliver a new level of service to the community:

- Helping students build their job readiness skills to meet the job needs of our region and beyond.
- Attracting thousands of people to our region and 38-acre campus each year. When we modernize facilities on our historic campus, those dollars stay in our community.
- **Meeting industry demand** for skilled workers to fill the growing number of trade, STEM, and health care jobs that drive our economy.
- Partnering with local school districts to address the fact that nearly 50% of area students do not pursue a college degree or credential.

Community colleges represent the future. A Business Roundtable survey found that 94% of CEOs reported problematic skill gaps for their companies. Community colleges ensure that future workers have outstanding technical, communications, and problem solving skills.

Opening Doors through Innovative Vocational Offerings - \$2.5M


LCC will create a new 47,000 square foot facility to replace three vocational and science buildings, designed and constructed more than 60 years ago. The new building will:

- bring together the College's welding, machining, and manufacturing programs
- provide modernized facilities for information technology and computer science programs
- house preparation for apprenticeship and transitional programs

By design, students coming to campus for GED and adult basic education programs will learn adjacent to our trade programs, exposing them to career pathways that could be the next step in their educational journeys.

LCC is working with the Washington State legislature to secure capital funding for the new building. LCC has received \$3.85M for Predesign/Design, and has requested \$35M for construction in the 2023-2025 biennium.

To complete the facility, the College is seeking \$2.5M in community support to bring in new, state-of-the-art equipment. Cutting-edge tools and equipment will elevate the new vocational center into a world-class skills center serving local high schools, industry, and unions. Students will go directly from college to career, filling the high-demand and living wage jobs of today and tomorrow.



Planning and Persistence: The College's strategic plan calls for the replacement of multiple aging buildings. Since 2008, with public funding and private philanthropy, we have accomplished a number of projects:

- 1. The **Rose Center for the Arts** (2008)— The center's performance and exhibit spaces have been designed to showcase arts and culture, and host community events.
- The Stoller Athletic Center (2014)—
 Our remodeled facility is available for
 use throughout the community, and
 home to Red Devil basketball and
 volleyball teams.
- 3. The **Health & Science Building** (2014)—LCC's most recent capital campaign brought together all healthcare and science programs in this new building.

Supporting our Student Athletes - \$2M

Red Devil athletics is a point of pride for the College and has long enjoyed strong community support. LCC's athletic programs bring top talent to our community, including many of the College's most well-known alumni. Even through economic downturns, athletics remains a stable part of the College's enrollment and revenue.

Athletics attract diverse and outstanding students to our campus, bringing a variety of perspectives and experiences that enhance the learning environment. Last year, our 120 Red Devil student athletes achieved an overall GPA of 3.34, with 34 receiving All-Northwest Athletic Conference academic awards.


Student success depends on more than covering tuition; Foundation support helps student-athletes with housing, equipment, and travel expenses. We strive to grow our endowment to \$2M so we can fully cover these annual costs (for 120 student-athletes), allowing booster support to augment additional athletic program funding needs.

Since losing the ability to use state funding to support athletics in 2011, the Foundation must secure nearly \$100,000 annually for scholarships and program support. Community support is also required for maintaining facilities.

Strengthening the College-Community Connection - \$2.5M

The College shares many outdoor athletic facilities with area clubs and schools, and as a result these facilities are heavily used and long overdue for upgrades and maintenance.

- LCC boasts the premier junior college men's baseball program in the Northwest. Our **historic Story Field** at the heart of our campus is beloved by the thousands of athletes and visitors who use it every year. Now 60 years old, we must address limitations by improving grandstands, lighting, and the entrance.
- The LCC women's soccer team shares use of Northlake Field with Longview School District. High use and wet weather result in a field that fails to meet the Red Devils' and community's needs. The College will work with the school district to invest in improvements, such as synthetic turf, lighting, and covered benches for the players.
- Our women's softball team shares a field with multiple clubs for both its practices and games, resulting in scheduling stress and unpredictable field conditions. We seek to work with the City of Kelso to improve the shared softball field. Furthermore, investing in an on-campus softball batting cage will provide the team greater flexibility for practice.

Vocational Equipment Fund: Invest in a world-class skills center


