Her novel, The Secrets of Mary Bowser (HarperCollins/William Morrow), is based on the true story of a black woman who became a spy for the Union Army during the American Civil War—by pretending to be a slave to the family of Confederate President Jefferson Davis. Leveen is a regular contributor to Disunion, the New York Times on-going coverage of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War, and her poetry, short humour pieces, and scholarly essays have appeared in literary magazines, anthologies, and on National Public Radio.
