#### **Director's Notes**

While working on the play, I came across this quote from Sarah Ruhl, our playwright, in a Washington Post interview, "I'm a playwright because many days I think it's important for the cultural health of the world we're living in. Other days I think, 'This is a really useless activity; the world is falling apart—better to be a nurse.' But I really would be a bad nurse."

How lucky for us all that artists and dreamers like Sarah Ruhl continue to do what they do best. Like many of Ruhl's plays, *Dead Man's Cell Phone* is a fairy tale or a dream, filled with magical moments that demand boundless imagination and theatricality. Her characters and their situations are very human and at times almost mundane, but she wraps them up in a mythic world full of fantastic possibilities. The familiar is always just a little bit *more*, inviting us to join her in asking "what if?", the most basic question that every theater maker is well versed in answering. Join us as we step into this fanciful tale and revel in Ruhl's spare, poetic, and surreal language. Allow yourself to embrace "what if" so you may see the wonder and truth of what this play has to share.

#### **Cast, Crew, and Production Biographies**

**Dean Baker (Gordon)** is a returning actor for Center Stage. #### **Playwright Biography**

Sarah Ruhl's plays include *In the Next Room, or the vibrator play, The Clean House, Passion Play, Dead Man's Cell Phone, Melancholy Play, For Peter Pan on her 70th Birthday, The Oldest Boy, Stage Kiss, Dear Elizabeth, Eurydice, How to Transcend a Happy Marriage, Orlando, Late: a cowboy song, and a translation of Three Sisters.* She has been a two-time Pulitzer prize finalist and a Tony award nominee. Her plays have been produced on and off Broadway, around the country, and internationally, where they have been translated into over fifteen languages.

Originally from Chicago, Ms. Ruhl received her M.F.A. from Brown University, where she studied with Paula Vogel. She has received the Steinberg Award, the Samuel French Award, the Susan Smith Blackburn Award, the Whiting Award, the Lily Award, a PEN Award for mid-career playwrights, and the MacArthur Award. Her new book *100 Essays I Don't Have Time to Write* was a *New York Times* notable book of the year, and she most recently published *Letters from Max* with Max Ritvo. She teaches at the Yale School of Drama, and she lives in Brooklyn with her family.

**Elizabeth Richard (Director)** is in her tenth year teaching and directing at LCC! Elizabeth holds a BA from CUNY, an Acting Certificate from The National Shakespeare Conservatory, and an MA from Eastern Michigan University. In the Pacific Northwest she has worked at The Actors Conservatory, ART, Oregon Children's Theatre, Lakewood Theatre, Portland Accessible Theater, and OSF~Portland. Most recently she appeared in *Men, Women and Ghosts* for Cygnet Theater in Portland and as the Narrator for Southwest Washington Symphony's *Ferdinand the Bull*. Elizabeth's passion for Theatre for Social Justice has led to work with Coffee Creek Correctional Facility and Planned Parenthood in addition to facilitator training with Theater for Living in Vancouver BC. Prior to LCC, Elizabeth taught and directed at Central Michigan University and acted for many years in NYC. Favorite directing projects outside of LCC include *Ramona Quimby* (Oregon Children's Theater), *Willy Wonka* (Midland Center for the Arts, MI), and *Race: How Blacks and Whites Think and Feel About the American Obsession* (CMU and Metro Detroit tour).

#### Theatre Arts Classes and Opportunities Fall Quarter 2025 Drama Classes Behind the Scenes and Onstage

**DRMA 101:** Introduction to Theatre is a college transfer course that studies the history, development, and the many areas of theater required to produce a play. In addition to directing, acting, and playwriting, students will learn about set, light, and costume design through the study of the current Center Stage play and other plays from various periods of history. Taught by Betsy Richard.

**DRMA 106 & 206:** Acting are college transfer classes that study the methods, techniques, and theories of acting as an art form. Taught by Betsy Richard in Center Stage Theater. This course is offered every quarter as DRMA 106/206, 107/207, 108/208 and each quarter focuses on a unique aspect of Acting. Fall Quarter's focus is scene study. The courses do not have to be taken in sequence.

**DRMA 116/117/118: Stagecraft** are college transfer courses that teach the basic principles of stage design, lighting, and construction of sets for our productions! Enjoy fun, hands-on education taught by our expert technical theater instructor Robert Cochran. This course does not need to be taken in sequence and is offered every quarter

**DRMA 196/296: Theater Rehearsal and Performance** is a college transfer course that invites you to work on a Center Stage production! Each term LCC does a fully produced, **fully face to face** play. Auditions are the first week of each term, and you can earn credits by working on stage or offstage in the beautiful Center Stage Theatre. Instructor permission required. Betsy Richard directs.

**Act One Drama Club** produces each quarter's play selection, participates in Campus Culture, and takes field trips to Seattle and Portland to see plays and tour theaters! To become a part of the teamwork and fun, join us in the greenroom and shop of The Rose Center for the Arts Fridays 10AM.
