Director's Notes

When Stop Kiss premiered in 1998, it won a GLAAD (Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation) Media Award and was on the Top 10 Plays lists of The New York Times, Newsday, New York Daily News, and other major publications. Stop Kiss opened shortly after Matthew Shepard's brutal murder captured the nation's awareness of the continued violence against the LGBTQ+ community. It was one of the first contemporary plays of the era to specify the casting of the play to 'reflect the ethnic diversity of New York City' with Son stating in an interview that, "I don't know anybody who lives in NY and only knows white people". The original production was extended three times due to popular demand. Yet this story of the unexpected blossoming of love between two "straight" women is still considered dangerous to produce. The core message of this love story, discovering one's identity and saying yes to it, is overlooked. In 2015 the willitplayhere review of the script, strongly recommends that theaters produce this play, "The playwright is an American and a woman of color... the city (NYC) of acceptance and opportunity seems in short supply of both, and that irony makes the play more relatable to a broad audience. My theater community isn't brave enough...yet. I hope that yours is."

It is now 2024. I hope our theater community is brave enough.

Theatre Arts Classes and Opportunities

Fall Quarter 2024 Drama Classes Behind the Scenes and Onstage

DRMA 101: Introduction to Theatre is a college transfer course that studies the history, development, and the many areas of theatre required to produce a play. In addition to directing, acting, and playwriting, students will learn about set, light, and costume design through the study of the current Center Stage play and other plays from various periods of history. Taught face to face fall quarter by Betsy Richard.

DRMA 106 & 206: Acting are college transfer classes that study the methods, techniques, and theories of acting as an art form. Taught by Betsy Richard in Center Stage Theater. This course is offered every quarter as DRMA 106/206, 107/207, 108/208 and each quarter focuses on a unique aspect of Acting. Fall Quarter's focus is Acting Techniques. The courses do not have to be taken in sequence.

DRMA 116/117/118: Stagecraft are college transfer courses that teach the basic principles of stage design, lighting, and construction of sets for our productions! Enjoy fun, hands-on education taught by our expert technical theater instructor Robert Cochran. This course does not need to be taken in sequence and is offered every quarter

DRMA 196/296: Theater Rehearsal and Performance is a college transfer course that invites you to work on a Center Stage production! Each term LCC does a fully produced, **fully face to face** play. Auditions are the first week of each term, and you can earn credits by working on stage or offstage in the beautiful Center Stage Theatre. Instructor permission required. Betsy Richard directs.

Act One Drama Club produces each quarter's play selection, participates in Campus Culture, and takes field trips to Seattle and Portland to see plays and tour theaters!
