

Director's Notes

This fall we commemorate the 400th Birthday of the great French playwright, Jean-Baptiste Poquelin better known by his stage name of Molière! Born in 1622 this playwright, actor, and poet is still considered one of the greatest dramatists of all time, along with William Shakespeare. *Tartuffe* or *The Hypocrite* is arguably Molière's most famous and beloved work, despite being banned by Parlement after the Catholic Church in France denounced it. Molière spent several years rewriting the play combining scathing social commentary with Commedia dell'arte inspired characters and plot. His 1669 reworked version of *Tartuffe* was a huge success. Unfortunately, Molière's tireless dedication to the theater took a great toll on him. In 1673 his health, already compromised by pulmonary tuberculosis, suffered greatly. Ironically, in a production of his final play *The Imaginary Invalid*, he was seized by a coughing fit resulting in a hemorrhage and was forced to leave the stage. Although theatrical lore says he died onstage after returning to complete his performance, he died a few hours later in his home.

It has been a joy to welcome so many new and returning students, faculty, staff, and community members to collaborate on this production! We hope Molière's razor-sharp wit, so lovingly translated by Richard Wilbur from French retaining its rhyming verse, tickles your fancy. Molière's clever ability to expose the hypocrisy of the pious and the rich alike is as relevant today as it was 400 years ago.



Behind the Scenes and Onstage

Introduction to Theatre DRMA 101 is a college transfer course that studies the history, development, and the many areas of theatre required to produce a play. In addition to directing, acting, and playwriting, students will learn about set, light, and costume design through the study of the current Center Stage play and other plays from various periods of history. Taught by Betsy Richard.

Acting DRMA 107 & 207 are college transfer classes that study the methods, techniques, and theories of acting as an art form. Taught by Betsy Richard in Center Stage Theater. This course is offered every quarter as DRMA 106/206, 107/207, 108/208 and each quarter focuses on a unique aspect of Acting. Winter Quarter's focus is Improvisation. The courses do not have to be taken in sequence.

Stagecraft DRMA 116/117/118 are college transfer courses that teach the basic principles of stage design, lighting, and construction of sets for our productions! Enjoy fun, hands-on education taught by our expert technical theatre instructor Robert Cochran. This course does not need to be taken in sequence and is offered every quarter.

Theatre Rehearsal and Performance DRMA 197/297 is a college transfer course that invites you to work on a Center Stage production! Each term LCC does a fully produced, **fully face to face**, full-length play. Auditions are the first week of each term, and you can earn credits by working on stage or off stage in the beautiful Center Stage Theatre. Instructor permission required. Betsy Richard directs.

Act One Drama Club produces each quarter's play selection, participates in Campus Culture, and takes field trips to Seattle and Portland to see plays and tour theatres! To become a part of the teamwork and fun, join us in the greenroom and shop of The Rose Center for the Arts Fridays 10 a.m. From backstage to onstage this group creates community benefiting its members and the entire LCC Campus!
