Today, March 11th, a member of our Emergency Operations Team was notified that an LCC student has tested positive for COVID-19. The individual was last on campus March 7th in the Student Center and the Health & Science Building and is currently in isolation. No close contacts were reported.

I understand that this news is concerning, and want to assure you that we are actively following guidance from the <u>Cowlitz County Health Department</u> and recommendations from the <u>Washington State Department of Health</u> and <u>U.S Centers for Disease Control & Prevention</u>.

Due to privacy laws, we cannot share the name of the individual or other personally identifiable information. Individuals who are known to have direct close contact with this person, and people impacted by any cleaning-related facilities closures were contacted with specific instructions.

Anyone with <u>symptoms of COVID-19</u>, or who may have been exposed to someone with a confirmed case, is encouraged to self-quarantine and contact their health care provider for guidance. Your information will be kept confidential, and we will connect you with campus support options while you work through your symptoms or positive test result.
